The National Association of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Workers and Practitioners (NAATSIHWP) are proud to invite the health sector and all Australians to join us on 7 August 2022 to celebrate the National Day of Recognition for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Workers and Practitioners.

Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Health Workers and Health Practitioners are the world's only Indigenous health professions underpinned by national training and regulation. For close to a century, this workforce has played a vital role in the safe and effective delivery of health services to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and communities.

With a combination of clinical, cultural, social and linguistic skills, they deliver an engagement capability and community reach that sets them apart from other health professionals. Providing a high standard of culturally responsive care and acting as cultural brokers and health system navigators for our communities. Although, as the peak body for the workforce, NAATSIHWP recognises that our members often do not receive the recognition and support they deserve for their crucial work.

NAATSIHWP Chairperson, David Follent, said: 'Our communities must have access to culturally safe and responsive care no matter where they are, and a strong, valued and highly skilled Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Worker and Health Practitioner workforce is key to this end'.

Building on the success of the inaugural National Day of Recognition last year, we will continue to celebrate the achievements of the workforce annually. This year we welcomed the new <u>National Aboriginal and Torres</u> <u>Strait Islander Health Workforce Strateaic Framework and Implementation Plan 2021–2031</u> which commits to increasing and expanding the workforce and in July, we celebrated 10 years since the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Practice Board was formed and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Practitioners became nationally registered under the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme.

NAATSIHWP CEO, Karl Briscoe, said: 'We know better health outcomes are achieved when our workforce are involved in our people's health care as we possess a cultural intellect that isn't able to be replicated by mainstream health professions'.

As it is a world first, our workforce should be a source of National pride. We welcome and encourage the health sector and all Australians to join us on the 7th of August, to celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Workers and Practitioners in their own local communities around the country. 





























"I worked in a small Aboriginal community in Bairnsdale, Victoria where my parents were a part of getting our local Aboriginal Medical service up and running.

I have been in a AHW for the past 30 years. Moved to Sydney 14yrs ago and worked at Redfern AMS for 9 years at AHW mums and bubs program, did some personal care in the wider community which I am still doing. Also worked with Mount Druitt with mums and bubs program for 3½ years and now been appointed to ALO at Auburn Hospital as there has never been a ALO here so setting up and ensuring that the Aboriginal community has the direct contact with ALO, making the community feel welcome and make sure that services are culturally appropriate. I have seen a lot of change within health and I am passionate about my people's health and wellbeing."

MICHELLE PEARCE ABORIGINAL HEALTH PRACTITIONER

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"My journey commenced in 2009 at the A&TSI Community Health Service, where I worked as a Trainee Child Health Worker. I was enrolled by the service to start my Cert III in Primary Health Care and once completed, I enrolled to complete my Cert IV in Primary Health Care (Clinical).

In 2012, I became registered with AHPRA as A&TSI Health Practitioner. I devoted 8 years of my career to the Community at ATSICHS Mackay where I worked with Child Health Nurses on immunisation schedules, healthy hearing clinics, baby developmental checks/milestones & completing 715 Health Assessments. I worked with Doctors in procedures on the use of clinical equipment such as (HBA1C machine, ECG's & spirometry, and various other clinical equipment.

My career working for AMS ended Feb 2017, when I moved to Queensland Health at Carlyle Community Health Centre in Child, Youth & Family Unit as Advanced Health Worker.

In 2022 I enrolled into Diploma A&TSI PHC and I'm now studying again. My only satisfaction in my role is having positive feedback on how I have helped Families and if there anything I can do to assist, if they are happy, then I am."

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"I commenced my career journey as the inaugural Enhance Primary Care (EPC) Aboriginal Health Worker (AHW) whilst working at the Illawarra Aboriginal Medical Service (IAMS) located in Wollongong NSW - south of Sydney. I further progressed to Male AHW, general AHW becoming the Clinic Coordinator come Clinic Manager and onto becoming the inaugural Health Services Team Manager whilst attaining my nationally accredited and recognised registration in 2015 becoming an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health practitioner. Following my stint at the IAMS took-up employment with GP Synergy who is the sole provider for GP training in NSW and ACT and the registered training organisation (RTO) for providing greatest volume of GP training in Australia for the Australian General Practice Training Program - AGPT under the Department of Health, Australian Government.

I am further a registered Cultural Mentor with Indigenous Allied Health Australia (IAHA) and affiliated with the Australian Indigenous Doctors Association (AIDA), Indigenous General Practitioner Registrars Network (IGPRN), Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP), Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM), the National Cultural Educator and Cultural Mentor Network with the RTON in GP training, and TAFE Digital and TAFE Western Sydney – TAFE NSW just to name a few of my activities deriving from my professional portfolio and extensive experience."

I am a qualified health worker with an ability to relate to clients and their families and provide culturally safe health care to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, such as advocating for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander clients to explain their cultural needs to other health professionals and educating or advising other health professionals on the delivery of culturally safe health care."

My health journey began in 2008 at the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Community Health Service as a Hearing Health Trainee. I enrolled in Certificate III in A&TSI Primary Health Care and once completed, I enrolled in Certificate IV in A&TSI Health Care (Clinical). In 2015 I registered with AHPRA as A&TSI Health Practitioner. I then successfully gained a position with Queensland Health as an Advanced Health Worker. Working with Indigenous youth from 12 - 17 years old at five different schools within Mackay Hospital Health Service Mackay district. Supporting Indigenous students and families with health-related issues.

I work alongside Indigenous Community Educational Councilors, School based Health Nurses and other supports e.g. Guidance officers, School chaplains and Youth support workers. Transporting students to medical appointments e.g. Doctors' appointments, Child youth mental health and Sexual health. Engaging students and families with culturally appropriate community organisations. In July 2022 I enrolled in Diploma of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health care. My passion is helping our mob improve and understand their health concerns and start being proactive in maintaining a healthy lifestyle and living long healthy lives. I love being a health worker at ground level working with our

This led me to study CERT II A&TSI primary health care and am now going into my Nursing Diploma, which will also take me through to Health Management.


I was employed as an aged care worker at the time and had been working in aged care for 6 years when I had a change of heart and a calling to fulfill my passion.


